Tree Removal by Scott NØAR

I had four Ash trees that were infested with the Emerald Ash Borer. This year they were bad enough that waiting to have them removed was no longer an option. Of course this left the stumps that needed to be ground down below grade. Luckily I didn't have any antennas in the trees but I did have coax buried close to the trunks. At the time the trunks seemed to be the be the ideal spot to run my buried coax next to. After all who would dig or put anything next to the tree? Enter the stump grinder. It made short work of a run of coax and control cable. The control cable was spliced back together and the coax replaced with a new run. It was for receive use so RG-6 was the cable of choice. The thought of spending a few hours trenching in the wires was not appealing. I made a quick trip to Amazon and soon had biodegradable yard stakes heading towards me.



These were four inches long, the cable fit in the opening just fine! Installation was quick, you only need a stake every ten feet or so to keep the cable down. With a daily watering the grass has grown over the cable. Soon you won't see any sign that it was there.

This is the same trick that works for radials on a ground mounted vertical antenna. I have almost sixty radials and you would never know by looking. The only drawback is you probably don't want to do any power raking for a few seasons.

So after two rounds of Covid, I was well enough to make the Ham Fest at Bob's. Great to see all the guys again. What a showing, the whole driveway was full and flowing over to the other side. I counted 5 rotors and 4 Amps plus many good radios and accessories. I missed a few good deals by procrastination and then went back Thursday and bought Bob's old KLM 40 Meter dipole. I search the internet for a manual and found they also made a 2 and 3 element version, which I found manuals for. But no single dipole. Along the way, I found the names of the founders of KLM and they had their emails on QRZ, so I asked one if they made a single and if a manual was available. He answered with yes they made one, but he did not have any info. The search goes on, but when I picked it up, it has permanent length connections so we can just put it together and test it for band coverage.

After the fest, I journeyed through the back roads to Oak Park Height, after a reroute due to construction, for the MARC picnic, which I was cooking for again. We set up a station and used Ron's new chameleon antenna. With the Big Shot sling, we shot one end up high and the other just lays on the ground. It worked fine on all bands listed. The guys rotated through and made 50 contacts that afternoon. The turnout was low because we didn't get the invite out on time so the 8 or 9 guys that participated did a good job. We ate high on the hog as they say with burgers, pork chops, chicken, shrimp and all the fixings.

I brought the Data Base up to date after I received all the membership apps and sent it out to the Board. I will continue to do that at least monthly. Our new method of handling funds is working well.

Breakfast today was crowded with 11 of us so three conversations worth. Since coffee is \$3.59 now, you really have to drink a bunch to get your money's worth. The Moon was over MiHami today!

So what is coming up? Sad to hear from Ben that he won't be running for his seat on the Board, and that Ralph doesn't want a second term. Volunteers are welcome and we will be doing motivational nudging on likely candidates. Join the fun and just do it!

Program volunteers have been slow coming in, but we have a few. Hopefully we will fill the months ahead. More importantly, how about a chair for this job? It's listed as a Board function, but it shouldn't be.

The Worked all MN Counties chair is still empty. Jay still needs a helper with snacks if he can't make a meeting. Ben is off, so I will need an Auction trainee, cause I'm not doing it forever.

Now back to Okinawa, fall of 1969. Really not a great change of seasons there. Summer highs in the 90's and winter lows in the 40's, hurricanes when and if they effected the island. Somewhere on the interscreen is a picture of Kadena Air Base looking down through the eye of one cane long ago. I lived through two, one in the barracks and the other at work (backup power). The barrack had windows almost ceiling to floor, for ventilation (no AC or backup power), to get cross currents of air. Great for normal days, bad for hurricanes. High winds caused them to leak water in, so it was a constant battle to mop (no wetdry vac) it up and dump it. We also reversed the bunks to the middle isle to keep them dry. Couldn't get to the mess hall so they offered C rations, which I always enjoyed, but others not so much. That was a short one on a day and a half, the next one was three days as it decided to spin around the island for a second pass. I was in the building at work, yes reception went on because there was no hurricane where they were. We planned ahead and brought snacks and food with us or it was C rations again. The snack bar guy had stayed with us to run the griddle and serve what he could. So I brought a beef steak in with me, had him keep it cool, and cook it when I asked for it on day two. It's funny now, but sure shows the differences for culture and cuisine. He tossed it on the griddle where he made burgers all day. Checked it and flipped it, but became unhappy with the speed it was cooking. So he grabbed it and put it in a rice cooker with some water and boiled it for 5 minutes, then back on the grill. Not a good idea. Poor thing came out light gray and limp. Tasted like soft leather. Coming out after the storm, we found many trees without leaves or branches and some roofs damaged along the roads. Luckily we didn't get a storm surge of ocean water into the flats, which would have been bad.

So I hear there is a museum or display of the WWII attack and clearing of the Island somewhere over on the big Fort Buckner. I found it, and was entertained and educated about how all the units came inland (unopposed) until they found the enemy inland and how it took over 2 months to clear them. Unfortunately, death was by suicide jumping off the cliffs on the south end when all else was done. I also took a motor trip down and around the island and stopped at the Castle and cemeteries of all the poor casualties.

There is also a wonderful U tube story of how Navel guns were heavily used to support ground operations during the battle. Fort Buckner, named after the General who did XYZ back in the day to make him famous enough, sat on the hills at the isthmus of the island. It had everything: huge PX and Commissary (like early Cub stores), bowling alley, all types of Clubs with entertainment, Movie Theater multiplex (in 69!), churches, VFW/Legions and much much more to keep the massive US troops happy. The hospital was a navy function a Fateama. Down the road Naha, the capital, also had everything we did but smaller and more congested. All the services were there and shared everything. Why not, all US dollars paid for. The Marines used the north end from Kin village up. The troops came in first, spent 2 or 3 weeks training for Nam and left, while guys coming back came in and spent 3 or 4 weeks recuperating, (later to be defined as a 30 day drunk). If I recall, Mariners were welcome to come south to visit us, but we were not welcome up north of Kin.

One more for tonight. I took the girls up north for a motor tour in the Fiat. It ran fine on level areas, but I noticed the temp gage was moving when we hit some hills. We had gone up the east side and took a cross island road to get back and take the west side road back. Central island is a big hill up and the Fiat was steaming. Got to the top but had to stop and let her cool down. I stopped at a field road entrance and let her steam, but I knew I needed to replace the liquid. We had a water bottle and added that but needed more. I searched around the road, pineapple on one side, tea on the other, and low and behold, I found pap sans secret big saki bottle in the grass! Let say I ran into some resistance when I said I was going to pour it into the radiator. Screams of we will catch fire and blow up, but, it was that or walk. In it went, nothing blew up, down the hill we went. Gas station on the coast, refilled everything and carried extra water and food for all and started home. I recall a long slow(max speed on Oki was 30mph), quiet but explosive atmosphere from the wudgy wudgy (mad) lady next to me and the other crying in the back seat waiting for the rear engine to blow up. Needless to say, we all made it back. So I needed to figure out why she overheated, the car, I knew why she did! So after checking coolant level and if the thermostat was working (it was) I crawled underneath and found that the radiator scope was partially obstructed and the radiator itself was covered over with crap. Driving down Route 1 one day, I spotted a sign, steam cleaning. I drove in and talked to mama son, no English, but got the idea across. Blast everything around the engine and down and around the radiator. She worked her magic for a few bucks and off I drove never to worry about that problem again.

Swapping stories with Steve and Mark at breakfast, we exchanged a few things about Clark AFB and the Navy jobs on Oki. I only got to stop at Clark going over to Nam. As I explain it, they let us out of the plane to stand around and expose us to what we should expect, being 95 degrees and 95% humidity in Nam. Steve lived there for a few years, Military brat, and I think was stationed there later on. Mark was there and lived at the same Torrii station on Oki, but worked up the hill at the Flare 9 antenna location. Google the Flare 9 or 10 and read about them. Probably one of our finest antennas of the era, but politically a poor investment. It cost us (USA) twice plus more to take them down than put them up.
