Label UP! By Scott Holisky NØAR

Ever hooked up the two meter antenna to the HF rig and wondered why the rig is so quiet? Lets put an end to that!

Around work we have a thousands of cables, all the same color and manufacture that are all labeled. To say cable labels can be important is an understatement. You don't want to accidentally connect something to the other that shouldn't be. Over the years we have progressed from using masking tape to now finally settling on labeling tape.

During our recent remodel one of the network installers was using a hand held "Brother" label printer that caught my eye. This turned out to be just the ideal replacement for our old failing printer. I was pleasantly surprised to see Brother offered a free software download of their application for both your PC and smart phone. The Brother program has a list of special uses for cable labeling, flags or wrap around styles. There are templates and examples for just about any item you might label. Using the computer program means you will get a label that looks just like what you see on the screen, gone are the days of tape waste. The program will also display rulers to help you know exactly what you are going to print, spacing has never been easier. All this and the ability to save the set-up and type in a file for use later on.

On one of my trips to the local office supply house a Brother tape printer on sale that caught my eye. It didn't have a keyboard and was only addressable via a USB connection (PT-1230pc). This little printer had it's own simple version of the full function program installed in its memory. You could simply plug it into a PC and use it as is or throw a switch and use the full blown software on the computer. So for a few bucks I had a printer that would do the same thing as the expensive hand-held unit under computer control.

Tapes are available in many sizes and colors. They are a bit spendy but since there is minimal waste it works out to be very inexpensive. I've tried some of the cheap offshore tapes, they seem to work OK but as for long-term the jury is still out.

Now every important cable in the shack has a label and there is no more guessing what goes where. My parts containers sport readable labels. You can print out a front panel

"white on clear" label, put it on your new project and cover the whole front with a photo mask just like we used to do with paper.

Don't toss your 70's Dymo label gun out yet. If you ever get into building flux capacitors you'll need it for the Plexiglas cover. Click click. (I still use my 70's Dymo label gun quite regularly — I just have to buy the tape NOS on eBay. Ed. :-)

TOPICS

Membership: Dale discussed 2018-2019 memberships, which are coming in rapidly. As of today, we have about 70. At the 2017-2018 year end, we had about 150, which included free memberships for those folks who earned (or upgraded) a license at our VE exam during the year.

Treasurer: Allan reported that the three funds (general, repeater and education) are in good shape. Income over the summer included donations for removing a SK's radio tower on 9/16 and proceeds for antennas sold at Bob's (KØIKV) Lake Elmo Hamfest on 9/15, and membership renewals. Expenses included our donation to the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund and rental charges for a storage locker (to store club equipment moved from the University of St. Thomas).

Ongoing expenses: In order to eliminate the monthly storage rental fees, we will be looking at alternative storage locations. We are exploring the possibility of purchasing a 10 foot box trailer, either new or used. This would be used to hold club equipment and also equipment donated for the January auction.

Radio sources changes: We bemoaned the upcoming closing of Radio City, with the notice posted in last month's *Ground Wave*. Dan and Maline Fish have been great sources of advice as well as equipment, and have made several presentations to our club. They will be selling off their remaining inventory before yearend, so you might like to make a last visit or two to see them. Randy pointed out that our closest radio store will be HRO, in Milwaukee. The drive would make a nice over-night trip. In his experience, HRO does a good job of mail order shipping (usually overnight to the Twin Cities area). With Radio City closing, we will explore building a relationship with HRO, to see if they

might like to advertise in the *Ground Wave* and possibly sponsor a door prize for the spring banquet. Our emailing list exceeds 200 names of amateur radio enthusiasts.

Upcoming events:

Board members will be working out the details. We are looking for possible speakers and topics for the auction, and will ask club members for suggestions.

Repeaters: George will attend the MN Repeater Council meeting on October 27th. We will work on the paperwork for moving the VHF repeater from UST to Terry (N0GOI) Londroche's shack. He has volunteered to host our K0AGF VHF repeater for us, and we will send him a letter to formally thank him for his donation of hosting services. The K0AGF UHF repeater is located in Dale's shack, and is being upgraded by Yaesu.

Website: Due to the buyout of our host service provider, we lost most of the content of our website. If you visit it now, the content showing is from February, 2009, but we did get a message at the top saying it was being rebuilt. Our rebuilder team includes Jay, Don and Tom (KCOINP) Bredemus.

Programs for future: November is Mike (NOANP) Ostlund, talking about Association of Emergency Radio Organizations (AERO). We are always looking for suggestions for programs.

Don closed the board meeting at 19:04.

The program tonight is on Satellite Communications:

Soren Straarup, AK4WQ, shared his experiences in working Low Earth Orbit satellites. His equipment is simple – an Arrow Yagi combining both VHF and UHF, and two HT radios. Depending on the satellite, the uplink and downlink may vary from UHF/VHF, VHF/UHF, VHF/VHF or UHF/UHF. His preference is to work roving rather than a fixed location. Sources of satellite tracks are available from many websites. He shared a video of working a contact, and how the antenna is moved to track the satellite.

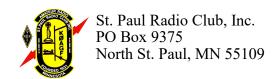
