Projects ahead. I purchased a small Chinese spot welder and have been experimenting with it to rebuild battery packs, and make new ones for other toys too. It's not like the \$10K machine we had at the battery store, but it will put cells together quickly. I need to buy some good old non gel super glue to fix the cells together before welding.

I have 2 old Hy gain 2M verts that need a rebuilding and testing. That means arranging the garage for work and getting some non-toxic heating to make it comfortable. That means disassemble, clean and replace parts as needed, reassemble and test.

I also have a complete set of the Hustler mobile antenna system that needs a home. These work best on larger vehicles that are not garaged, or have high overhead doors. There is a fold over mast or two, but you have to remember to stop and lower it before it goes boom. If interested, let me know.

Field Day Results by Pete Guldan KD0SQJ

The ARRL has published the results for Field Day and They appear on page 64 in the December QST. So how did we do? Because we changed form category 2A to 3A, I got out my calculator and did the apple to orange math.

Last year our score (3716) places us in the 389th highest out of 2902 entries. That equates to just below the 87th percentile of all entries. This year we scored 5806, which is the 149th best overall score. This moves us over the 95th percentile out of the 3112 total entries.

In 2018 using the results from just the 2A stations we made 62^{nd} highest out of 328 in that category. This equates to the 81^{st} percentile. 2019 we ranked 34^{th} out of 309 submissions in 3A. This bumps us well over the 88^{th} percentile. Any way you measure we improved our score.


Okay that's enough math to make my head spin for a while. We did not make a clean sweep. There were 2 sections we were unable to communicate with. Newfoundland/Labrador only had one station operating QRP. They logged 12 contacts. The Northern Territories had 2 stations making a combined 115 contacts. One was an Emergency Operations Center and the other was a mobile station working QRP on battery power. We did contact that elusive North Dakota section. We made a few DX contacts as well. Cameroon, (I had to look it up, Atlantic coast of Africa just above the equator) Haiti, European Russia, and Turkey. Did I mention North Dakota?

There was a 3A station in Minnesota operating with a special event call sign who did have a score higher than ours. There was also a South Dakota station who scored really high. This makes us the number 3 scoring station in the Dakota division. We did however score higher than all the Wisconsin stations in our category.

I would like to give a big personal THANK YOU!!! to all of you who helped make Field Day fun and a big success. I want to encourage everyone to mark your calendars for the weekend of June 27th and 28th 2020 and hope to see you all there.
