CQ contest CQ contest CQ 160, Contest QRZ.

I can't imagine how many times I received or transmitted something like that late - late night from Feb. 21 to 23. All I can say about the CQ 160 Meter contest is that it was fun to be on the Top band again. Have to say thank you to Ray Johnson WB0EBG down the block for the heads up that it was happening, and another thanks to Ron KØRJW and Al WØNLY for helping install the OCF dipole in early winter.

Here is my operating recap and I'm throwing in a review of the N3FJP logging/contest software that I use. We also use that software for Field Day ops and it also covers has over 100 other contests, all for one price. Website <u>N3FJP.com</u>.

Not wanting to scare everyone away, I started a bit late and running barefoot, about 0120Z and got 20 of the easy big guns and some locals until 0300Z. My ears were not used to the noise, so I took a break until 0520Z. From there until 0915Z I made 45 more contacts and called it a night. First night total was 65 contacts, 25 multipliers, (states, provinces and DX) and just over 3200 points. The plan was to get some sleep and come back strong Saturday evening running QRO (high power).

The N3JPF software ran smoothly and as intended, keeps very good records that are easily edited if needed, checks all your callsign inputs and shows if they are even close to a duplicate. It also inserts the RS(T) of 59 that we all use in contests, even when it take 10 tries to make the exchange. You can check your contact counts state by state, and sort on any column to help when editing for operator mistakes, like putting in ID (Idaho) for IN (Indiana). The screen colors contrast nicely and are easy on the eyes. Retrieving files for contest entries is simple and help is available throughout. Many of the contests they cover use exact or very similar screen layouts so learning one usually covers you for more.

Back to the action on Sat. evening. I set up to use the amp about 0000Z, but it didn't respond. Long story short, I messed with it until I figured the contactor must be stuck and went back to barefoot contesting at 0130Z. Made 10 new ones until 0230Z, and broke for another nap before my forehead hit the mic again. At that early time, it was mostly the big guns and already worked ones and lots of noise.

Back in the chair and refreshed at 0500Z, made 39 more contacts until 1000Z, many of them digging very hard in the noise between lots of others out there. This is all using the Hunt and Pounce method. By this time, one can look at the software and get a picture of what multipliers are needed and start looking for them. Sure enough, I needed NV and MT and I could hear them both doing H&P right next to me as we all rolled up the band looking for targets! I couldn't find new stations calling, so I took another two hour break.

It is now 1200Z, 6 a.m. here. Sun is breaking, birds are singing, Deb is making coffee, I can't sleep yet, so let's do this one more time. But this time I set up on a frequency a couple times, and started calling until I got an answer. Then another and more and it was really fun. Note here that the CQ 160 Contest is not like the cutthroat high speed contests on the upper bands. I think players are patient and friendly, because it takes so much work just getting a station to cover the Top band, they show respect toward each other.

I topped off the night an hour later with 22 more contacts and a nice group of multipliers. The point to notice here is the solid proof that calling will outperform H&P all the time. That last hour of calling produced 16% of my contacts. By then, 0100Z, the band was falling off and only those same Big Guns that started the whole thing were still machine calling away looking for the last contact.

End results: 138 contacts, 50 multipliers, missed DC, NV, MT, WY (everyone was looking and calling direct for WY, must have been a sale at ODM or a good snow base on the slopes) stateside, (AK and HA are considered DX), 4 Canadians, ON, AB, MN and PE (boy was that one tough!), and the lone DX Cayman Is. (there were two stations but the other never heard me). QSO points 306 for a grand total of 15,300 points. Big contact states: OH-12, IL-11, WI/MI-7, MN/MD-6(Funny, 6 out of MD but no one awake in DC, or is it?) Not bad for a barefoot, E to W OCF dipole at 60 feet that needed to be tuned about every 50 KHz to be effective.

March is here. Midwinter Madness Hamfest is coming with it on March 21st. At a recent gathering of the qrp group that meets on echolink someone brought up how they would like to build something but didn't have a workbench. So as the conversation moved around the group everyone described their setup. Pretty revealing stuff. A couple of guys didn't have anything, one had a bench but it was buried under 20 years of projects, the list covered just about possible set-up. As for me I couldn't imagine life without a good dose of empty horizontal spaces. My indoor bench not only sports a 2×4 foot workbench and LED lights along with that all important 4" magnifying light. It is pretty much a "does all" bench so you might find fishing lures one day and the XYL's painting project the next. The picture is my old Black and Decker Workmate holding up what I call my "project board". It's al-



most two foot square. By putting a 1×2 across the bottom the Workmate can clamp down, making it quite sturdy. You can fit your anti-static mat inside if you need. There is plenty of room for building small projects and your soldering gear. Clamp on led lighting is the way to go. They are light and can be moved as needed. At the end of the day you can fold up the legs and hide it all away if you need to. I like the 2" sides, this helps with chasing down those parts that seem to walk around by themselves. There are several different portable units out there that could do just fine as a stand alone bench. Look them over and find something that meets your needs, then get building!
