Cheap and Easy SDR

Lyle Koehler, KØLR

Lyle will provide a brief review of what SDR is and the present state of SDR technology including examples of currently available SDR transceivers and receivers. The presentation will include a live demonstration of the \$15.00 RTL-SDR dongle and some of the available free software. Lyle will also suggest where to find additional information.

Lyle got his Conditional class ham license in 1951 while stationed with the Army in Germany, and upgraded to Extra in 1960. In the meantime, he received a EE degree from the University of Minnesota and went to work for Honeywell. Retirement in 1990 left a lot of time for tinkering with things like low-frequency operation, APRS and Software Defined Radio.

Details for this year's Banquet came together a bit later than usual so notice was short. Despite that, we had a good turnout of members and family, with thirty four registered.

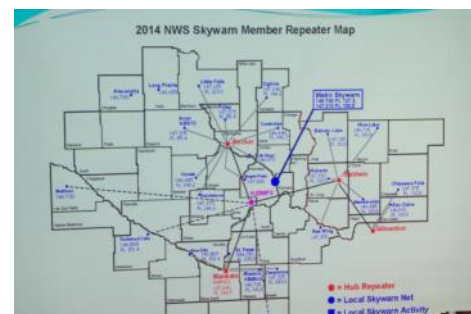

SPRC Mug—Order mugs with current design on both sides, adding the SPRC website url.

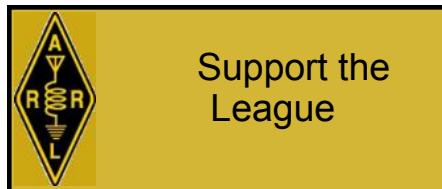
