Our May program will feature SPRC member Randy Gawtry, KØCBH, speaking on "Amateur Radio - 120 years Later: advances in Amateur Radio from the beginning to today and beyond."

Randy's credentials include more than 50 years of field and laboratory experience in data and voice communications, signal processing and instrumentation covering the frequency ranges of <1 Hz to laser light. This work encompasses physiological, subterranean, underwater, fresh and saltwa-

ter surface, terrestrial, fixed structure, aeronautical, and space environments. Clients include a multitude of industries, medical companies, commercial entities, government administrations and all branches of the U.S. military and many government operations which shall remain unnamed. His education includes a B. of Physics and three years of Electrical Engineering graduate work at the University of Minnesota as well as MBA from the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota. Past employers include North American Rockwell Corporation, Cubic Corporation and Electronic Design Company. He has been president of Timewave Technology Inc. since its inception in 1984 and also has been an owner of HRD Software, LLC. since its inception in 2012. The latter two companies both design, manufacture and sell products to the amateur radio market worldwide. He is an author and co-author of several papers in the fields of instrumentation, communications and biology. He holds an Amateur Extra Class license and has been an amateur radio operator for 59 years.

Bulbs and other offenders by Scott Holisky NOAR

I have been very cautious about bringing anything into the house that may create more HF interference. Everything that plugs in get the RFI test with my little portable shortwave radio. If the new device spitting out garbage on the bands it gets tamed by the use of ferrite cores or returned for a more compatible unit.

My garage door opener blew one of the "rough service" bulbs, so I thought a led bulb would be a good replacement. In fact I took out the other 60 watt bulb and put a led in there too. Nice white light, you could actually see in the garage! Backed out of the garage and the door wouldn't close. Finally got out with the remote and down it went. The xyl had the same issue, it opened fine but wouldn't close. Modern led bulbs are generally pretty quiet on HF. Sure if you get right up to them they spit out hash, after all their power supply is being switched on and off. You guessed it the led bulb was interfering with the opener and covering up the remote signal. Oh and these little openers work between 300 and 400 MHz. A different manufactures bulb solved the problem. Guess I'm going to have to expand the testing parameters.

There is a lot of good information on the internet on how to tame RFI. One of the best sites I've found is from Jim Brown K9YC. His article on A Ham's Guide to RFI, Ferrites, Baluns, and Audio Interfacing is a must read. You can find it here: https://tinyurl.com/22g2hx

One of the big offenders are solar panel control systems. There are switching devices that improve the efficiency of the panels. Many of these are not filtered and radiate a huge amount of RFI that can be heard for blocks away on the average ham setup. The cure for eliminating the interference isn't that expensive or difficult to implement. The issue is it takes a few bucks away from the profits. Last year I was at at hotel on the Western shores of Costa Rica. A three hour trip over the mountains and through the jungle to an island. When we arrived the entire place was covered with solar panels. They were an experimental site for using solar power. It was an impressive installation and looked as sound as anything you'd expect to see here. Good solid connections and very neat.

Near the hotel my portable shortwave radio was absolutely saturated with RFI. The only place that it worked was at least a hundred yards away from the panels. Did I mention





